your emotional tank needs to be recharged.

The Sea of Galilee is in the north of the Jordon Valley-about 13 miles in length and 7 and a half miles wide. It lies 680 feet below the Mediterranean Sea. It is a depression surrounded by hills, especially on the east side.

When the cool currents rush down from Mt Herman (9200 ft high) through the narrow passages between the steep hills and collide with the warm air above the lake basin there is a tremendous down rush.

Winds whip the Sea into a fury, beating the water into an uncontrollable wildness, causing high waves and easily water-logging fishing boats.

Application:
